In the past, military installations have been the most reliable source of open land to be used for Solo II events but that is over for the foreseeable future. As of the date I am writing this there is still no replacement, although several alternatives are being worked on, including Aloha Stadium which was used back in the 1980s. As soon as we have a location and a date for our next Solo II we will get the word out. If anyone knows of a site that could possibly be used for Solo II please let Curtis Lee. Colin Sato or me know about it. Speaking of Solo II, for those of you who are SCCA members and get Sports Car, be sure to check out the Fastrack appendix in the October issue. There is a new listing for the stock classes for next year and there are a lot of changes.

We did have the wheel to wheel race, Solo I and track lapping sessions back in early September, although I was not there to see it. A number of the usual workers were not present so special thanks to all the workers who did turn out to help make it a successful event. I hope the workers who were out for the first time enjoyed it enough to come back. Both drivers and workers are needed before an event can be held. Again, take a look at the October issue of Sports Car. It has an article on the joys of being a race worker and what kinds of skills are needed. One of the advantages of getting licensed as a SCCA race worker is the opportunity to work at other tracks. Gerald Luke, Robert Blickly and I were on the mainland in early

September where we worked the Molson Indy Grand Prix in Vancouver and the following weekend the American Le Mans Series race at Laguna Seca. We had the best seats in the house for a total of 11 professional races over a six-day period. The only problem occurred when Gerald and I were scheduled to return to Hawaii from San Francisco on September 11th. We both got out three days later.

We do have the last Regional Race of the year coming up at HRP on November 4th. It will also include Solo I and track lapping sessions.
